How to live responsibly

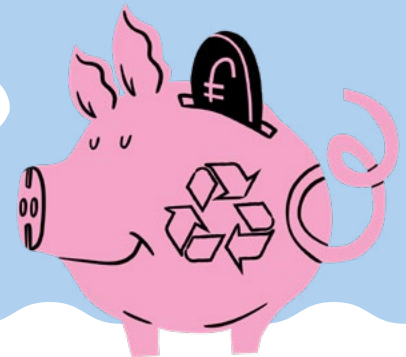
- Buy less.
- Buy durable products and favour second-hand items.
- Use your items for a long time, maintain and repair them.
- Donate or sell your unwanted items for reuse.
- Borrow and rent things. There is no need for you to own everything. You can also share costs by owning things together with others.
- Recycle your waste. Do not litter.



Why is all this worth it?

- **You will save money:** When you buy durable and second-hand items, you will not need to buy new items very often. When you maintain and repair items, they will last longer. This way you will save money in the long run.
- **You will protect nature:** When you buy fewer new products, you help conserve natural resources.
- **You will combat climate change:** When you buy fewer new products, you will reduce the amount of production, transportation and waste. This will reduce greenhouse gas emissions and help combat climate change.
- **You can meet new people:** You can make new connections when you borrow or rent items. The company of others and doing things together make life more meaningful.
- **You will benefit from wellbeing:** When the environment, the economy and your community are stable and healthy, your personal wellbeing improves.

Did you know: circular economy means an economic model in which materials and products are used sparingly and sensibly. This reduces the amount of waste generated. The tips provided in this brochure are examples of everyday circular economy.

Libraries

At the City's libraries, you can borrow books and magazines in different languages, as well as movies and music. You can also borrow a variety of tools, exercise equipment, musical instruments and other items. Different libraries have different selections.

Borrow: Drills, tennis racquets, headphones, heart rate monitors, skis, skates and musical instruments.

Enjoy activities, work, print: You can use computers at the City's libraries. You can also print things. At some libraries, you can play games, use a sewing machine or play the piano.

Varaamo

Varaamo is the City of Helsinki's facility reservation service. Varaamo has a wide variety of facilities and equipment that you can reserve for personal use free of charge or at an affordable price. You can reserve meeting rooms, work desks, banquet facilities, event venues, studios, cottages and saunas. You can also reserve and use various devices, such as 3D printers and sewing machines.

City bikes

City bikes are bikes shared by all. You can rent a city bike for a day, a week or the entire season. You can also rent a bike for several months by placing a continuous subscription via the city bike website. One journey can last up to one hour. The bikes are available from spring to autumn.

Uusix workshops

Uusix workshops are places for rehabilitative work activities. They involve repairing recycled goods and using them to make sustainable and ethical products.

Donate: Bicycles and bicycle parts, textiles, small decorative items, construction supplies, timber and metal.

If a housing company wishes to donate bicycles removed from its yard or parts thereof to an Uusix workshop, the workshop will pick them up free of charge.

Buy: Handicraft products, repaired computers, computer components, restored bicycles, bicycle parts, building parts.

Pakila Work Centre

Pakila Work Centre provides rehabilitative work activities. Attendees make and restore furnishings using recycled materials.

Buy: Restored furnishings, as well as small household items and heating briquettes made at the work centre.

Pääkaupunkiseudun kierrätyskeskus – Helsinki Metropolitan Area Reuse Centre

Pääkaupunkiseudun kierrätyskeskus is a non-profit company. It supports and encourages the reuse of clothes and items and provides information about environmental matters. It also provides unemployed people with work opportunities.

The Reuse Centre has sales outlets across the Helsinki Metropolitan Area.

Donate or Buy: Clothes, books, tableware, bicycles, furniture, carpets, household textiles, toys, records, household appliances and electronics.

Take for free: All the outlets also have a section where you can take items for free.

Stara Kierrätyskeskus – Stara Reuse Centre

The Stara Reuse Centre sells the City's decommissioned assets. Individual devices and items are auctioned the year round at the kiertonet.fi website. Vehicles, machinery and other larger items are sold in a separate auction in spring and autumn.

Buy: Large and small machinery, exercise equipment, hand tools, construction materials and vehicles.

Yard sales and park jumble sales

Did you know that you can sell your own used items in public yards and parks?

If you are selling your items off a blanket on the ground and you are not blocking people's passage in the area, you do not need a sales permit from the City. However, remember to clean up after yourself and take away any items that you did not manage to sell.

Helsinki also features places where people gather in the summertime to sell their items. These flea markets do not have an actual organiser and every vendor is responsible for their own sales spot. The event requires a permit if there will be many vendors in the park area and structures such as chairs and tables will be used for selling items.

Waste sorting

– Find information

Sorting waste is important to prevent it from causing any hazards. When waste materials are sorted correctly, they can be used to make new products.



HSY Helsinki Region Environmental Services Authority

HSY provides municipal water supply and waste management services. It produces information and carries out active circular economy work.

'Waste guide' search site: Not sure where you can take your waste? The HSY waste guide will help you. You can find the waste guide on the HSY website. Enter the type of waste into the search field and the guide will tell you what category the waste falls under and where you can take it.

Do this when sorting your waste

- Only bring types of waste that have designated containers for them to the waste facility of the housing company. The waste must fit into the waste container.
- Keep the waste facility and its surroundings tidy to prevent rats from spreading.
- You must not bring any electric devices, large items or hazardous waste to waste facilities, such as medicines, batteries, accumulators, paints or chemicals.
- Take old or unnecessary medicines to a pharmacy.
- Return batteries with their terminals taped shut to a store selling them.
- You can bring large items to a Sortti Station if you have access to a car.
- If you do not have a car, you can order a pick-up service for large items for a fee. The pickup service is called Sortti-nouto ('Sortti Pick-up').
